If east opens 1♣ and south overcalls spades, west could end up declaring NT, maybe held to seven tricks on a spade lead.

At other tables south might open a weak NT and get close on a spade lead - a heart or club beats it two tricks. Where 1♠ is opened and passed round east is likely to protect with a double, west maybe declaring hearts, or NT.

E/W can get a decent score, best being 150 in no trumps, but only if east declares, probably a rarity.

Will any steer this into the right hand?

Where west declares on a club lead south just might try the ace after a club goes to the 10 and king. This sets up the queen for a heart discard.

East will usually find himself in 4♠, though west just might insist on 3NT, looking at his diamond stop. Some of the time 3NT will be best, but not today.

East must have been saying his prayers this morning, as the spade queen drops doubleton, and the K9 doubleton is onside in hearts. The result should be an overtrick, and 450 on the card.

Defending 3NT the defence just might fail to lead diamonds, plugging away with clubs, despite north being entry-less. Lucky any who rack up 460 as E/W.

A south multi or Weak Two in spades could mess E/W about, getting them overboard. They won't where west overcalls 3♣, probably playing there. This might make if heart ruffs are missed, though a spade ruff is available, north's 6 better than east's 5, and so it should be at least one light.

West might risk a 2NT overall instead, relying on his good suit, and trusting in a diamond stop opposite. E/W can go plus in the unlikely event that this is passed out. Far more likely is that 4♥ eventuates after a transfer. This spot has a loser in each suit.

Well done any with an E/W plus, 140 declaring hearts best.

Another hand where the cards lie nicely for declarer. N/S may get to either major suit game. An Acol 1♥ by south practically guarantees 4♥ being reached. A strong NT by south might see a part-score. Those using Stayman surely arrive at the winning spot. Conservatives who transfer to spades may not.

With the spade ace doubleton onside, hearts breaking, and both diamonds onside eleven tricks can result.

There is scope for error. Declarer could mis-play the spade suit, starting with the king, or possibly finesse the diamond 8 (finessing clubs is as good a shot). In any case west almost certainly splits his honours in diamonds.

A north strong NT makes it easy for E/W to get to their heart part-score, whether east's 2♥ shows hearts and a minor or just hearts. Over a north Acol 1♠ 2♥ may still be overcalled, love all being the time to bid, though some east's may double instead. Luckily west bids hearts.

Again, the cards lie well, declarer able to have 140 on the card, losing just a trick in each suit.

Could be a fairly flat board.

Either north or east might open or pass, but with 26 HCP E/W are still likely to declare 3NT. Declarer can easily make three spades and has five other top winners. Where east declares south needs to avoid a diamond lead, which cedes the 9th trick to the knave.

Where west is in charge the bidding may steer north from the top club lead, though may not if the suit could be short. With the suit led by north, crashing south's 10, the clubs can be set up.

The winning spot is 4♠ on the Moysian fit, Here, declarer can succeed on a cross-ruff, ruffing a heart and diamond in west.

West is best passing a south weak 1NT or 1♣ opener, but some might bid hearts or double 1♣. Either gets E/W into penalty territory (though admittedly 1♣ redoubled does go light, in the unlikely event of everyone passing north's redouble).

Left alone, N/S surely find 3NT, which should record ten tricks, the heart 9 likely scoring at trick 1.

Some might only make 600 on a passive lead, but I reckon most will have 630 on the card.

Where north opens a weak NT east may well get to 2♥, which makes in some comfort. A 1♠ opener is overcalled 2♥, and south could support spades. East might push on to 3♥ or defend.

3♥ makes double dummy, east pulling trumps and ceding two clubs.

2♠ is interesting. East is stuck after cashing three hearts, having to cede a ruff and discard (best), or play a minor to disadvantage. The only defence is for south to improbably declare and west to start with a club.

It looks like a part-score possible either way, though 3♥ looks the more likely make in real life.

N/S might or might not get to 4♠, depending on whether north makes a simple raise of partner's suit, taking a conservative view of his bare diamond king, or makes a stronger raise.

Today, the diamond king is working, finesses win, and 650 is possible, picking up trumps and setting up clubs.

Most routes will lead to 3NT by north, which may well be blessed with a spade lead, otherwise a club.

Of course, Deep Finesse makes eleven tricks in all eventualities, though few will do so in practice. The club king is overtaken and diamonds run via a finesse, squeezing east in three suits. He cedes a trick, and another via an end-play whatever he does.

Will there be many 660s on the card? Will any manage 6♦? It can be made by north, but hard to see it bid.

Despite 28 HCP 3NT isn't there by west after a club lead, though the defence could block the suit if the king is played. East can make nine tricks when diamonds and spades break evenly. Of course south might lead the heart 2, feigning strength, and east go two light.

Acol gets 3NT played by east after he responds 1NT to west's 1♠, whereas a 1♦ opener likely sees west declaring after rebidding NT.

In practice, I suspect many will be successful from either polarity after sub-optimal opening leads, maybe with overtricks.

I can see some in 1NT, maybe higher, when west's 1♣ is overcalled 1♥, and east makes a Sputnik double. Others will prefer the nine card club fit.

Declaring clubs, declarer can make ten tricks if the club queen is picked up, ruffing one heart loser and pitching the other on the diamond queen, which can be established.

The play in NT depends on north's lead. A diamond is best, followed by a heart switch, holding declarer to eight tricks. Where north leads a heart declarer can escape with only four losers - two heart, a diamond and a spade.

Where east opens 1♦ south doubles and north almost certainly declares a heart part-score. Where east selects 1♣ south has a 1NT overcall, probably playing there,

1NT proves to be an inferior spot, held to seven tricks when west has the spade ace to lead a third round of diamonds through the 10.

Playing in hearts south can ruff the third diamond and pick up trumps. The percentage play is ace followed by the 10, in a position to pick up the guarded 9, as here. 140 is possible, even perhaps 170 if the defence broach spades.

N/S may get to a diamond part-score should east open a weak NT, passed to north, who could protect with 2♥, if played as hearts and a minor. However, west may elect to transfer to clubs before north gets to bid.

Passed out in 1NT and getting a diamond lead, setting up four defensive tricks, east can make eight tricks without playing on clubs, simply finessing hearts. 3♣ could do better on a diamond lead, though a spade lead should get four defensive tricks.

N/S's diamond contract should be held to eight tricks. However, it does need an early trump lead from west.

Like #18, there is a solid game on, 4♥ by N/S the best scoring spot. This should be easy enough to bid, with north having an opening himself hand opposite south's more than solid opener.

There is a some danger of getting too high, but it should be possible to establish the absence of two aces.

In practice, east needs to grab the diamond ace early on, else south's two losing diamonds disappear on north's spade winners, the knave conveniently dropping.

North is maybe best to jump to 3♥ when south makes a Two level response to 1♠. If a 2♥ rebid is played as forcing to at least 2♠ (best) that leaves more room for manoeuvre. N/S might bid the the very borderline heart slam, or more likely stay in game.

Today, slam rolls in so long as the trumps are guessed correctly. They may well not be as at least one south trump is needed to ruff spades, plus the percentage play in trumps is low to the king and finesse the 10, picking up four to the queen in west.

Will many have twelve tricks in the bag? I doubt it.

Lacking defensive values a "weak" 2♠ call is maybe best by south over east's 1♥. This might silence west, though playing 5 card majors he can safely advance to 3♥ holding four trumps.

This one is a tricky level call for both sides. N/S can make 140 declaring spades, though it needs declarer to play clubs for two tricks, leading to the king, then later playing the 10, pinning the 8. Improbable, unless of course west leads his doubleton.

Not many will manage that, so we could have many losing 50 in 3♠. However, that is better for N/S than the 140 available to E/W playing in hearts.

Declarer needs to bring in the spade side suit for one loser. This involves ruffing the third round with the king in south, without touching trumps, and later taking a trump finesse against the knave.

Will many have ten tricks in the bag, whether or not in game? Some surely will.

Will many manage to have a slam recorded, whether in diamonds or NT? Diamonds is more comfortable, as the roof would otherwise fall in were a heart finesse to lose following a club opening lead.

North has a 1♥ or Strong 2♥ opener. It is not remotely a 2♣ opener, having neither 5 Quick Tricks nor game guaranteed. However, with south having decent values and a heart fit of sorts game will certainly be reached, and some might essay slam. Like #13 and #21 slam is possible, but only double dummy.

Declarer needs to win the spade lead and pick up trumps using a south club entry. Now trumps are run. East is strip-squeezed to give up spades, and must either give up clubs as well or be end-played to lead a diamond.

A good one to have on the card.

However, south doesn't know this, and might try 4♠ or 5♣. These prove a disaster for N/S, quite possibly doubled, when a plus was available defending hearts.

We have another possible 3NT opener here, again by west, though this time east has a more modest collection. 3NT could eventuate whatever west opens, though 4♥ by east is a viable and perhaps better alternative.

East can actually make 3NT, though west cannot on a heart lead and perfect cashing out. By contrast, 4♥ should make, though is no picnic to play on a spade lead and continuation, shortening dummy.

So we end with another hand with various outcomes possible. It is hoped that the set was enjoyed.
