There are various possibilities. One is that NS will score plus 530 from 3♠ doubled. The auction is P - P - 1♥ - 2♦ - 2♠ (protected by his earlier pass) - P - P - 3♦ - P - P - 3♠ - P - P - ? East might think he is worth a double. The outcome should be a disappointment. With the alarm bells ringing, North loses just 2 aces and 2 trumps. If East had only passed (in tempo) I expect 3♠ would normally have drifted one off.

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3rd seat at favourable vulnerability is the right (only?) time and place to open this hand with a weak 2♠. North may overcall 3♠ and South has a pot at 3NT. A top spade lead or a diamond lead and spade shift is required. Otherwise, declarer has time to establish a heart for the 9th trick. If West passes, North might do also with the lowest ranking suit. If North has come to play, a good shot is a fourth seat 3♣ opener. 9 tricks are easy and there are chances for a 10th.

South opens 1♠. Some Wests with no respect for vulnerability may make a Michaels cue bid. They will have more respect when they write 200 or worse in the minus column on a partial hand. If West passes, a Zia tip is not to pass partner's nonvulnerable opener with any excuse. Not a good hand for Zia followers - if North bids 2♠, South will reasonably raise to game, where there are 4 losers even with East's quacks lying under South's AK10s.

Over a weak 1NT, the North hand looks like a vulnerable 3♠ to me. Lots of offence, so if the remaining points are equally divided 3♠ should be a happy spot. Today the auction proceeds 4♣-4♠-5♣. Visualising the club shortage opposite, North bids 5♣. I expect an occasional appearance of that rare primate, the "striped-tailed-ape" - the term for doubling them in game when they can make slam, as North should by establishing hearts.

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At different vulnerability, a weak 1NT by South might be popular. If the bold West who made the Michaels cuebid on hand 3 has moved to the South seat he should be taught another painful lesson. Double of 1NT and any run-out ought to be 1100. This time the defence can afford to drop a couple of tricks and still beat those in the heart game. Back in the sober world, EW bid unopposed: P-1♠-2♥-4♦, or P-1♣-1♥-1NT-2♣ (Checkback Stayman) -2♦-4♥.

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Some will pre-empt with the East hand, probably missing their game. Those who open 1♠ will certainly reach game, with 3NT likely to be popular. West might drive towards the poor slam after 1♠ - 2♣ - 2♦ - 2♥ (4th suit) - 3♦. A keycard ask might put the brakes on, but with 5♦ likely to be outscored by 3NT some Wests will still bid the poor slam. Hoping to have a diamond trick, South might lead the ♠A, speeding up play.

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4♥ by West is a fortuitous make but few will bid it. If South has a weak 2♦ in his locker he may play 3♦ when North supports after the 2♥ overcall. If West re-opens with a double the stakes could be high if East passes for penalty. 3♦ has 5 obvious losers, but the defence need to unscramble their tricks. If West leads a top club for a count signal he must switch to hearts. Since the penalty pass suggests short hearts the switch should be found.

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This should be a flattish 3NT making 10 tricks. North-South bid 1♣ - 1♦ - 1♠ - 1NT - 3NT. West leads a heart, declarer dislodges the ♠A etc. But wait! Deep Finesse makes 11. How does she do that? (DF is a woman because she is never wrong). Win the ♥K and lead a diamond. Back to a club for another diamond. That makes 12 tricks if East doesn't cash out. But If West has the ♦A DF has just gone down in a contract even her husband would make.

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All routes lead to 3NT by South. West has an interesting choice of bad leads. The 4th best heart, despite North's bid, gives a tempo but does no immediate damage. I would choose a club, solving declarer's problem in that suit. The 11th trick now comes from finding the ♦Q. Those searching for 4 diamond tricks will play West for the queen. Those who only need 3, perhaps after my "unfortunate" club lead, should go with the odds when they uncover the heart position.

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Deep Finesse is on form again, racking up slam in hearts or NT. This one is definitely odds against and won't be reached very often. 1♥-1♠-2NT-3NT should be common. The likely club lead collects the ♣Q. Declarer may eventually deduce that East has a single spade. Will he play him for the ♠K or the ♣J? Since the ♣Q is a squeeze menace if West has to guard diamonds, I expect most to get this right.

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Love all is bidders' vulnerability at match-points. South kicks off with a weak 1NT. West shows the majors (a Landy 2♣ is the popular toy) and East chooses 2♥. If this is passed out EW will score an easy 140. Some Norths will not surrender so easily and re-open with 3♣. East does best to double that, but can collect a winning +150 by passing and leading ♠A, ♥K, ♠KQ pitching a heart, ♥A, heart ruff. I doubt that will happen often; more likely East will accept the push to 3♥.

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Those who open 2♣ to show spades and a minor may incur an unfortunate result: a heart lead from North sinks 4♣. If East declares he can ditch a heart on the ♠A before North gains the lead. Mostly East will declare 4♣, bidding unopposed 1♣-3♣-4♣. (The 5th trump makes the West hand worth 3♣.) Some Souths may venture a shape-suitable double, but the vulnerability will dissuade North from -500 or worse.

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Less action at Game All. At many tables West's 4th seat 1NT will end the bidding. There are 8 obvious tricks, 5 obvious defensive tricks. Can West find a 9th trick? Win the lead with the ♥K, spade to ♦9 and ♣J. Heart return to the ♥Q, cross in clubs, take a deep breath, spade to ♦10 and... ♣A (phew!). 9 tricks if hearts are woodenly cleared. If West tries that, check that his bravery pills conform to WBF doping regulations.

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A likely 3NT by North, perhaps via 1♣ - (1♣ overcall)-2♥-3♣-3NT. East dutifully leads partner's suit and 9 tricks are the norm, the defence making 2 hearts, ♣A and ♦K. At some tables a lot of points will hinge on a club guess. West is likely to have a doubleton at most, having followed to 3 diamonds. Since East did not open a weak 2♥ the odds favour a finesse, but if the penalty for losing to a doubleton jack is 3 down (spades having been cleared) it will take some courage.

Does double of a major promise 4 cards in the other major? Here East must surely be allowed to double a 1♠ opener. If South passes, West bids 2♥ and plays in the wrong denomination. If South bids 2♣, West passes and East doubles again. Now West can bid 2NT showing two places to play (it cannot be natural by a hand that couldn't bid a round sooner). East bids 3♣ and West 3♦, showing the red suits. Reaching the 4/4 minor fit may be rewarded as spade leads would defeat 3♥.

East has a difficult response to 1♣ - not really worth 2♥, but the alternative, 1NT, is a hideous distortion. With the heart king well placed and spades 3/3, 3NT makes a lucky 10 or 11 tricks. However, 4♥ runs into 3 top clubs and an overruff. Most will settle for a partial. Those in hearts will usually be held to 9 tricks. Many in No-trump will record plus 210. It would be a very perceptive defender as South who cashed the third club with partner baying for a diamond switch.
