East is wiser opening 1♠ than stretching to 2♣, he unlikely to make game opposite a bust. When south preempts 4♥ and west competes to 4♠ it is hard to blame east for bidding slam.

Twelve tricks can be made by east in spades, the diamond 10/9 used to finesse north for the knave and the clubs picked up when south's knave falls under the ace.

Will many make a dozen, whether or not in slam?

With a nice 6-carder east surely tries 1♣, and west has nice support, plus opening values. However, despite west stopped or semi-stopped in every suit 3NT isn't there, beaten on a heart lead.

5♣ is the spot, declarer able to pitch a losing heart on the third diamond, and happily nobody able to ruff. Trumps are then played and only another spade lost.

Will many get this right, or will there be some minuses?

This hand is a bit of a classic, the 4:4 heart fit playing a trick better than the 5:3 diamond one, slam possible in the right red suit, losing spades thrown on diamonds.

However, north opens 1♠ ahead of east, he overcalling 1NT. Now E/W should at least get to the heart game after using Stayman, but some may err by playing 3NT, beaten on a club lead, albeit not necessarily found.

In any event slam is a decidedly dodgy proposition, it needing both red queens to be located to succeed.

Will any have 680 on the card? Or at least go plus in a red suit?

South could well enter the fray with 2♥ in the pass-out seat, where 110/140 is possible so long as the heart knave is felled. Indeed, this is N/S's best shot, they only beating 1NT by one trick, scoring 100 (or maybe letting it home).

It will be interesting to see who goes plus here.

3NT proves a close enough call, it requiring a winning view in clubs, or hearts to be played for three tricks, tricky with reduced west entries.

Any trying the simple 50% shot of the diamond finesse probably ends up light.

Will many have 400 on the card - or a penalty?

Declaring either contract at least one dummy ruff is required for the tenth trick, since hearts don't break, making the entries and handling awkward.

I can see some ending up with only nine tricks.

With west cold for 110 in spades N/S need to advance to 3♣ or 3♥, where they have a plus - 3♣ being the easier but lower-scoring spot.

West can bid on to 3♣, but could easily be doubled - losing the dreaded 200.

Not everyone will judge this one correctly.

Absent the thin overcall N/S will wend their way to either 4♠ or 3NT. In this case the 5:3 fit proves superior, making an extra trick, north's trumps stopping the defence making any heart tricks.

However, again the handling may be awkward. I'd rather defend, if given the chance.

I guess there could be some stopping in diamond part-scores, unsure whether there are nine runners after the only spade stop is knocked out.

A bold game on 24HCP, but the diamond length compensates.

This one is all about whether N/S can reach 4♣. They will surely do so if south stretches to open a weak NT or 1♦ on 12HCP and such a flat hand.

Where south passes north has enough to overcall 1♣ with 1♠ and south raise. Now if north tries for game with diamonds south will bid game, knowing of the secondary fit.

Declaring spades, declarer should be able to combine chances by twice finessing in spades. Indeed, the defence need to be careful to cash their heart ace or it disappears on clubs.

North might just bash 3NT over south's 1♠, or could take it more slowly, bidding 2♣. Either way, 4♠ is the likely spot, though some may declare 3NT.

Those in 4♠ could go light, twice finessing in diamonds, and also losing a club and trump. Declarer can succeed by ruffing down the club queen or dropping the second diamond.

3NT could fail as well, a diamond losing to the queen, west winning the club queen and east another diamond. So long as a major is led now the defence get five tricks. A club back lets it make, the defence never making a spade.

Well done any defeating 3NT.

Like #10, opener has a thin, balanced 12 count. This time opening doesn't pay, unless the oppo come in. Admittedly, they likely will, west showing the majors over a weak NT, and east electing for hearts.

The worst scenario is where north opens 1♦ and south elects to make a weak 3♦ jump. East will pass west's takeout double, the result a nasty penalty.

Left alone, west opens 1♠ in fourth seat, and probably gets to the par major part-score where E/W should have 140 on the board - but it could be more if N/S are too aggressive.

South is decided thin, but most will open 3♠, despite east already a passed hand. West doubtless competes with clubs, and north raises spades. Many easts will now go on to the club game.

N/S are one light in 4♠, so have done the right thing bidding on. In theory, E/W are best to double and take 100, as they are light in 5♣ on passive defence. However, north surely leads a top diamond.

Even if a low diamond is continued east ruffs high and can take another high ruff after felling the trump queen, later finessing the trump 8. Declarer makes a diamond by force, the three diamond losers ruffed or played under a north winner.

Will many make 5♣ after an understandable losing lead?

Another thin vulnerable weak NT in north again, although at least this one has a bit of shape. The result will presumably be 2♥ by north. East might be tempted to double the vulnerable opponents in either, but is end-played at the start and cannot defeat 1NT, 2♥ (or 3♦).

Where north opens 1♦ east doubles, and the diamond part-score - much easier to play - is the most credible spot now.

Hard for E/W to go plus, in theory at least.

South has a rock-crusher, but it is awkward when east opens 1♦ in third seat. Double looks best for now, north bidding either 1NT or 2♣. 2♠ by south now shows a hand too good for 1♠ originally, but north could still pass - missing the cold slam, never mind game.

Indeed, with the spade suit behaving, plus a good heart view, all 13 tricks are possible.

Most will end in 1NT after the top three suits have had an airing, south declaring. A few could play 2♦, south giving preference to north's first suit.

It looks as if 1NT should make on a normal club lead, the most the defence getting being a couple of hearts, two clubs, a diamond and maybe a spade.

In practice, it looks like an overtrick may ensue, important since north cannot be prevented from making nine tricks in diamonds, 110 beating 90, but not 120.

Declarer can make ten tricks by twice playing clubs towards the queen, a heart going from dummy eventually. Indeed, the defence may help point the way by leading the suit at the start.

In theory, this should be flat at 130, but things never work out like that. There could easily be those declaring no trumps or hearts, making an inferior score, or even going minus.

Should east respond 1♠ to west's 1♦ N/S might be best to keep schtum and collect vulnerable penalties from the eventual E/W landing place - probably 2♠.

However, south could enter the fray with 2♣, and north end proceedings with 3NT. East does best to lead hearts.

North gets in with an early heart and can finesse in spades, then play a club to the 9 before clearing the suit. The defence are unable to get five tricks before declarer gets over the line.

In practice, 3NT could well fail, and getting 100s in penalties from E/W or playing a club (or diamond) part-score could prove best.

The bashers simply bid 3NT when south overcalls east's 1♣ with 1♥. Science might get there after a west double - or it might not.

Today the "bid what you think you can make" brigade easily make the nine trick game when the spade finesse wins and the heart king is a trick.

Some may not open the east hand, but could still get to game after a west weak NT or 1♣ opener, whether or not south intervenes.

It looks like those in 3NT will top the traveller, and might even make 430 on a non heart lead, the diamonds possibly providing a tenth trick.

It looks natural to win the opening lead and draw trumps before trying to ruff clubs good. The 5:1 break is a blow, but declarer can recover by finessing in diamonds and cross-ruffing the minors.

N/S surely get to 4♠, whether north opens a weak NT or 1♣. East likely bids hearts or shows a one-suiter, but will be brushed aside.

Assuming a heart is led many will only make 420, but 450 is possible. Trumps are drawn and a club led towards the QJ. The last winning club provides a discard for a south red loser (even had west had a second heart a diamond goes instead).

Will the best technicians spot the winning play? Running the queen loses three tricks, as west now stops the fourth club being a winner, and declarer loses three tricks. Twice leading towards the Q/J offers a 50% shot, plus the 35% of a 3:3 break, whereas running the queen only offers the latter.

Acol wins hands down on this one, north opening 1♠ and declaring a spade part-score, probably after west competes with clubs over south's raise. By contrast, a north strong NT is probably passed out, west declining to enter the auction at adverse vulnerability, though some may, and help steer N/S into the better spot.

Declaring spades, it is close how to play trumps. Two finesses against the king and 10 are marginally better than playing for the doubleton king. However, south is short of entries so many will do the right thing.

With 170 available in spades the 90 recorded in 1NT won't look too clever on the scorecard. However, it does need east to lead a minor to get six defensive tricks - plus care not to block clubs.

Again, we have 3NT, unless east or west have a death wish, enter the auction at adverse vulnerability and going for a penalty.

This time there are nine tricks via a heart, five diamonds and two clubs, plus a spade. However, the defence is under pressure when diamonds are run, and an extra spade is there, even if it hasn't been led at the start.

3NT proved a popular spot in the set, plus there were a few slams, and some intricate declarer problems.

It is hoped the set was enjoyed.
