N/S might have an unopposed auction to 2♠ if east is silent. If there is a 2♣ overall of north's 1♥ N/S need to have methods. 2♠ is normally played as forcing, a double followed by 2♠ as something resembling south's hand, and expected to be passed.

E/W can defeat any spot above 2♠ via two diamonds, a club and two club ruffs, though that is double dummy. However, a heart lead is awkward, a club followed by a heart, or a trump all causing difficulties.

I can see a few being held to 110 even without the optimal defence.

It is notoriously difficult to play in the 4th suit, diamonds, this being forcing, and not promising the suit. Sadly this is E/W's best spot, where they can rack up 130, losing just three spades.

After west rebids 1♠ east is probably best to simply try 1NT, likely playing there.

1NT can lose the first six tricks in the black suits, but might well escape that fate. Declarer can then unblock hearts and run the red suits when the diamond queen conveniently falls.

Lots of possibilities here.

N/S might have an unopposed auction to 2♥ after preference given, though west could open a thin weak NT or 1♣, north showing hearts or hearts and a minor.

Defending hearts the defence do best to cash two clubs, but are then a bit stuck. Playing diamonds cedes a trick, spades picks up the queen, and a trump does likewise to the heart suit, the 9 eventually finessable.

I reckon most will succeed, but some may not. E/W can actually make 3♣ in their nine card fit, and might well get there when west opens his ratty 12 count at adverse vulnerability. So N/S losing 100 might not be so bad.

Despite the vulnerability north could well pre-empt 3♣/4♣ over west's weak NT or 1♦ opener. With the trump knave falling and the diamond QJ short declarer surprisingly should make ten tricks.

This could prove a decent enough result for E/W, who are liable to lose several hundred if they declare, east entryless.

Few will enjoy this one as E/W.

E/W could be inconvenienced should north open a decidedly thin 3♣ (I wouldn't). Left alone, east shows diamonds and west spades.

Whoever kicks off the auction, it is far from easy for E/W to appreciate the perfect fit, with thirteen top tricks in either possible trump fit, thanks to the 3:2 spade break.

Will many manage to get to at least the small slam on 23HCPs? The hand is an excellent illustration of the power of long suits with side controls.

East has the hand you don't want when partner's weak NT gets doubled. East might pull to the red suits, but that works poorly. Holding a high honour in his shortage pass looks better.

Double dummy three rounds of spades collect eight tricks and a 500 penalty using south's diamond knave as entry - improbable, unless peeking. Most will only get 200, but at least shouldn't let it make.

Where west opens 1♣ north overcalls 1NT and probably declares 2♠. This can be held to eight tricks, but makes nine on a passive diamond lead, declarer clearing trumps.

Not a good one for the weak NT.

South should get his second suit, spades, into the game on his first rebid, and north raises. Most will bid game, and this cannot be defeated. Indeed, declarer can make eleven tricks when the trump 10 falls, if the situation is guessed correctly, the 8 later finessed.

Some might be in 3NT, which could be allowed to make, but should be defeated on a diamond lead, though discards are uncomfortable when seven clubs are run. West could throw diamonds to keep hearts, allowing a spade to be established.

Will many have 650 on the card, or 600?

1NT is a close run thing, the defence needing to be careful not to set up the club 10 before they have seven tricks in the bag. Best is to lead hearts and let declarer play suits.

My guess is many will make 1NT, but not everyone.

When north opens 1♦ south could be tempted to jump shift with 2♥, this best played as either a game forcing self-supporting suit, or a good side suit with a fit with the opened suit. South clarifies with 3♦ over north's 3♣. In all truth south is not remotely worth it.

Even without the over-excitement at the fit some might get overboard into the diamond game, though most won't.

Hopefully, the majority will simply have a part-score plus on the card.

With the even trump and heart breaks making 4♠ with an overtrick should be easy,

Will any miss this one? They might well. It is only east's diamond void and lack of wasted values that make it viable.

South is a bit good for a pre-emptive 3♣, but the alternative of 1♣ or pass will hardly appeal at love all. Put me down for 3♣.

The south pre-empt could propel E/W into declaring 4♠ rather than 4♥. 4♠ can be held after a heart ruff, and is decidedly awkward if a ruff and discard is given at trick 3.

However, all is well when trumps are 3:3 with the king onside, diamonds useful entries. By contrast, 4♥ is pretty straightforward, making with an overtrick.

Will any miss this one, or many play in the wrong suit, getting an inferior score?

Whether west opens an Acol 1♥ or a minor should not hamper getting to the spade fit. West is likely to drive to game, but east is not without, so few should miss this one.

Unfortunately, a club ruff with the short trump hand and unhelpful lies make matters a tricky. However, declarer can still succeed on a cross-ruff, so long as he doesn't pull three rounds of trumps, the club knave cashing for a red suit discard, as south has to follow.

Will many muddle this one and go light? It would be easy to.

This looks like a bidding battle between west's hearts and north's spades, west surely bidding 2♥ on his own and north quite likely upping the ante. E/W need to advance to the 3 level to get a decent score.

E/W can make 3♥, despite possibly being shortened via diamond leads - the fall of the trump 10 very helpful. It is hard to see N/S advancing to the three level, where they can manage eight tricks in either spades or diamonds - though declaring spades north must not over-ruff a high trump should three rounds of clubs be played.

Even doubled, losing 100 is cheaper than ceding 140 in hearts.

After north's 1♣ south might make a 3♣ pre-emptive jump over east's diamond intervention. North should advance to game, but is unlikely to investigate slam, there when south hold a singleton diamond.

N/S also have a game in no trumps, south stopping spades and north the diamond suit. That is a better scoring game when slam is missed.

Defending clubs, east ends up stuck, declarer able to set up a spade trick by ruffing down east's honours and eventually squeeze east in the red suits.

It is similar in no trumps, though at least east makes a diamond and two spades.

The defence is easier where south declares, east seeing the trump suit, possibly being in a position to duck the trump ace to leave declarer a guess on the second round.

However, on a spade lead declarer has to take a hair-raising line, winning and finessing the club knave. South is entered in diamonds and a spade pitched, before a heart is played to the 10.

I can't see that many 680's on the card.

At adverse vulnerability most wests will refrain from making a weak jump in diamonds, which seriously derails N/S's bidding.

Unimpeded, N/S might find 4♣, 5♣ or 4♥, with my money being on 4♣ as the most credible spot.

Against spades, west could easily take the club ace too soon, allowing an overtrick. 4♥ is most uncomfortable on a diamond lead, north seriously short of entries, but can get home by playing trumps from south.

The best spot is 5♣. With east on lead nothing can stop spades being established and south entered in hearts.

Any sacrifice in diamonds could be a make, the spades ruffed out, and 11 tricks possible unless the ♥Q is led.

East has a weak NT, and west 8 HCP, yet it is N/S who can make a lucky 3NT, albeit nobody will be there. N/S can make six diamonds, two clubs and a spade before the defence take five tricks.

This might happen in defence if east's weak 1NT is passed out, though most will play in spades. It looks as if 2♣ should make, but the defence can play diamonds and later promote a trump with the third diamond.

In theory, a lot of E/W minuses. In practice.....

Some may make ten tricks, east starting with a top club. Declarer can now ruff out clubs and one spade finesse picks up the suit. On a top diamond there is time for east to switch to trumps. Twist and turn as he wishes, declarer has to lose two more clubs.

East opens either 1♥ or a weak NT, and west will surely insist on spades, even in the face of club intervention by south.

However, E/W will usually bid 4♣, hardly unreasonable on the face of it, with 12 HCP opposite a balanced opener, but theoretically doomed.

This time, any reasonable defence should suffice. Declarer has two losing trumps and two club losers. Hearts can be established for a club pitch, but there are insufficient entries to cash it.

It looks like nine tricks are the limit, unless a club goes to the ace and a club back forces north to ruff a loser with a winner.

I would hope everyone will get to 4♠, a few possibly stretching to slam, though this will be tricky after south's first round pass, especially if north opens the correct Acol 1♣ (over which east might overcall in hearts).

Deep Finesse makes the heap by ruffing the clubs good and playing trumps from the top. Indeed, entries may make taking the finesse awkward.

West could regret it if he passes south's double of east's weak NT. The defence can take the first eight tricks, and declarer still has a heart guess. However, it does need south to find the spade switch after a top diamond.

With both sides having eight card fits it is probably best that they play in one, awkward after the weak NT.

Where east opens 1♣ south probably doubles, and is gratified when north doesn't bid hearts, playing either a spade or diamond part-score.

A bit like the previous board there could be a bidding battle, surely won by N/S, holding the spades, and they can comfortably make nine tricks when the diamond finesse succeeds, E/W best circumspect at the vulnerability.

By contrast, nine tricks are there in NT, though on a diamond lead the club 10 must be finessed, or the defence have five tricks before declarer has nine.

We finish with another borderline game, though most will be in part-score (if they even play this exhibit).

No trumps is perhaps the best strain, though it requires an anti-percentage view in diamonds to make nine tricks, probably otherwise held to six on a club lead.

Most will be in the diamond part-score, where there should be an easy 110, whether or not diamonds are guessed correctly.

Another hand with variable outcome, game possible but unlikely, rather a theme on the set, it is hoped enjoyed.
